DISINFORMATION NARRATIVES YOU MAY COME ACROSS

CLIMATE CHANGE

Classic Denialism: climate change is one of the topics <u>most</u> <u>targeted by disinformation</u> during the <u>EU election campaign</u>. False stories minimise or even <u>deny the impact of human</u> <u>activity</u> on climate change, while other baseless claims allege that the climate crisis does <u>not even</u> exist.

New Denial: examples of this new form of climate denialism keep on circulating, with <u>renewable energies</u> and <u>electric</u> <u>vehicles</u> as targets. False stories are also circulating targeting the European Commission, which allegedly announced restrictions on showers and the use of water for EU citizens.

Conspiracy theories: alongside the usual false news circulating on <u>chemtrails</u>, climate change is staged, and natural disasters are said to be <u>manmade</u> in order to impose restrictions on freedom of movement, like <u>lockdowns</u>.

XENOPHOBIA AND IMMIGRATION

Demonization of migrants: false news portraying migrants as <u>violent criminals</u> keep on appearing, sometimes calling for <u>mass deportations</u> of migrants, described as unable to adapt to the European lifestyle.

EU political will for uncontrolled immigration: misleading content indicates that the European institutions are deliberately provoking uncontrolled immigration flows as <u>EU</u> borders are allegedly not controlled. Migrants are also said to receive <u>special benefits</u> at the expense of EU citizens. This type of false news can further trigger <u>anti-immigration</u> <u>sentiment</u>, for example when <u>exaggerating the scale</u> of rallies against migrants, and impact the results of EU elections.





1. Disinformation about Donald Trump conviction: Considering the political closeness and affinity of different EU political parties with Donald Trump, the news that the former **US president has been found guilty in a hush money trial** is likely to trigger disinformation in the EU. It is possible that disinformation will exploit the events in the US to heat national controversies (eg. about the independence of the judiciary, the rule of law and so on) or to convey conspiracy theories (eg. about deep state plots, democracy's subversion and so on).

2. Disinformation about the EU electoral process: As the European elections are taking place next week from 6 to 9 June, it is likely that disinformation targeting the elections process or integrity might intensify, calling the elections rigged or unfair as already happened in Germany, where several false claims questioned the fairness of voting procedures in recent weeks.





3. Escalation of the conflict in Ukraine: According to US officials, President Joe Biden has authorized the use of US arms in limited strikes on Russian territory, in connection with the recent discussions about allowing Ukraine to employ donated weapons from its allies to reach military targets within Russia's borders. The decision might trigger further disinformation on the escalation of the conflict and the direct implication of the EU and the West in general, while Russian media and authorities in past weeks threatened that the move could lead to the outbreak of a new world war.

4. Disinformation about LGBTQ+ issues: LGBTQ+ communities could be the target of intensified disinformation during Pride Month in June. Polemics based on false news are already circulating, for example regarding the rainbow flag: false content claims that it has supposedly been created to attract children, as the community is often falsely associated with pedophilia. According to disinformation, some EU Member States are also allegedly promoting pedophilia with laxist laws for possession of child pornography.
