Unmasking Disinformation Through the Ages!

Supported by **DE FACTO**: "Les Infox de l'Histoire," a podcast by the Fondation Descartes in partnership with Franceinfo, returns for its third season. Journey through history to explore major episodes of disinformation. The podcast analyzes significant falsehoods from the 17th century to today. Topics include conspiracy theories, manipulations, rumors, slanders, and media frenzies. This eight-episode podcast deciphers historical lies.



Detekto.hu is a new site for children to help recognise fake news, developed by **HDMO**. It features explanatory videos and interactive tasks for practicing the detection and verification of false information. The site covers typical types of fake content, factors making us susceptible to misinformation, reliable news sources, questions to assess authenticity, and tools for fact-checking. The materials are free and available to everyone, with the first three of four packages already online, to be fully released by 2025.
